Reformed churches globally have traversed a path toward church growth over the years, redirecting their focus from a confessional stance towards an emphasis on evangelism. Unfortunately, amidst this shift, many within congregations lack a comprehensive understanding of their beliefs. It's time to realign our churches and theological institutions, steering them back toward a confessional-driven approach that enriches our understanding of God and fuels vibrant evangelism.

The ancient Creeds—the Apostle's, Nicene, and Athanasian—serve as timeless testaments to the collective wisdom of early Christians. Born from rigorous study, prayer, and spirited debate on the Scriptures, these formulations offer believers a succinct yet profound confession of their faith.

"Creeds or confessions of faith... give a summary of its doctrines and a testimony to the truth as it is in Jesus," aptly remarks Archibald Alexander, acknowledging their significance in encapsulating the essence of Christian belief.

Later Confessions and Catechisms, like the Westminster Standards and Heidelberg, offer a structured framework to plumb the depths of Scripture. They serve as guiding lights, enabling profound reflections on the person and work of Jesus Christ while equipping believers to navigate life's intricate challenges. These documents aren't mere relics of history; they are indispensable tools for engaging in apologetics, offering clear and compelling defences of our faith.

Charles Hodge underscores, "The use of creeds or confessions of faith is not to prevent diversity of opinion, but to prevent a diversity of teaching on fundamental points of doctrine," acknowledging their role in preserving the unity of essential Christian beliefs.

J. Gresham Machen, in his work "Christianity and Liberalism," ardently championed historic Christianity as enshrined in the creeds and confessions. He adamantly defended these documents as the bulwarks against modernist reinterpretations that threatened to dilute or discard core Christian doctrines.

Let us, therefore, embrace these foundational documents as beacons illuminating our path in an increasingly complex world—a world where the proclamation of Christ's truth requires not just conviction but also clarity and depth. In this pursuit, may we stand unified, equipped, and resolute as we navigate this challenging yet opportune era for the Christian faith?

Pray for China Day 2024

It has been our practice in the past to encourage our supporters and local congregations to unite to uphold Christians in China as well as the works of Reformation Translation Fellowship in prayer before God.

Ever since the Communists took over China, Christians continued to be persecuted and harassed. Here is the latest update on the current situation in China by <u>Barnabas Aid</u>.

The Chinese Communist Party (CCP) is continuing to tighten regulations on all religious activity, including Christianity, alongside the CCP's emphasis on "Sinicisation" (making Chinese).

In measures effective from March 2022, conducting religious activities online now requires official authorisation. Organisations and individuals wishing to provide religious information online must apply to their local Department of Religious Affairs office. Sermons, worship services and training activities run by religious groups, religious schools, and temples and churches may be broadcast online only after obtaining a special licence. Some churches have successfully gained licences, which are valid for three years.

Content aimed at young people is also severely restricted, and no foreign organisations or individuals are allowed to operate online religious information services within China.

Regulations introduced in June 2022 by the State Administration for Religious Affairs (SARA) and the Ministry of Finance increased state oversight and regulation of the finances of churches and other places of worship.

Despite continuing measures against unofficial congregations, known as "house churches", the number of Christians continues to rise, estimated at around 150 million. The intensity of persecution varies across the country, often initiated at provincial or city level but in the knowledge of the CCP's approval. Many house churches have been closed and members arrested. Crosses have been removed from churches, and Biblical paintings or Scriptures replaced with portraits of President Xi Jinping or his quotes.


The CCP's high-tech surveillance systems continue to target non-atheist minorities. A sustained campaign of persecution has seen tens of thousands of Muslim Uyghurs interned in "re-education" camps in Xijiang province.

At the 20th CCP National Congress in October 2022, President Xi was chosen to lead for a third term, suggesting that existing repressive policies against Christians are likely to continue.

This year, we invite your church to mark March 17 on your calendar as the 2024 Pray for China Day. Please encourage the congregation to take photos of the occasions so we may use them in our upcoming newsletter updates.




- The emerging Churches in China will be solidly grounded upon the Scriptures and sound Reformed doctrine.
